PILFERING from Catering Department has soared to an all-time

high.

"The amount we've had stolen so far this term is as much as all last year," said Catering Manager C. W. Reynolds. "The situation has got so bad that at one time last week we had complaints from the services that they were running short of equipment."

Since the beginning of this term nearly 40 per cent of the knives—£62 worth—over 25 per cent of the forks, and more than half the teaspoons, worth £17, have been stolen from the Union's seven service points. The figures for cups and all other implements are similar.

"The situation isn't desperate yet," said Ken Overshott, Chairman of the Catering Committee, "But there's been a marked increase in the amount of stealing,"

### **Figures**

This time last year about £60 worth of goods had been stolen; so far over £110 worth has disappeared into the flats and halls of Birmingham. Figures for the first term of the session are always much worse than either of the other two, but until now have never been on this scale.

"There isn't much we can do about it," said Mr. Reynolds. "There's no reasonable way of stopping it that isn't more expensive than the stealing itself. We're hamstrung by the large number of service points the Union has got, and there's nowhere we can check the stocks each evening. We certainly can't afford to emulate the refectories' method of handing out cutlery to each person as he comes along."

The refectory also has its troubles. Over £800 worth of cutlery and cups have been borrowed — as Mr. Humbert (Refectory Catering Manager) puts it — since the refectory opened last year. Half the spoons, one-thierd of the cups (1.750) and over one-fifth of the knives have disappeared from the original stock.

"I expect we'll get some of it back eventually," said Mr. Humbert. "I think people take the attitude that they're just borrowing them for as long, as they like, to equip their flats or their rooms in hall. Now they're starting to provide implements in the new halls the numbers should start to drop,"
