EMERGENCY COUNCIL **ANSWERS**

MATUMFRO

"TOTALLY unacceptable," was how Mike Red-house, Guild Treasurer, described a letter from the University Council telling the Guild of their decision on the censorship of student publications. At an emergency meeting of Guild Council, proposing a motion which rejects the University Council's decision, he said, "We must take quick, vehement, unqualified steps . . ."

The emergency Council was called at twenty-four hours' notice to discuss what Mike Redhouse described as "the most important issue, the most basic issue, and the most urgent issue in my four years at University." "The University have no right to judge on Guild Publications," he said. "This is a negation of the students' right to an autonomous Guild."

On Thursday the Secretary of the University Council sent a letter to Tony Klug, Guild Precident, telling him of the Councils' decision Until this letter was received it was generally thought that University Council would merely endorse the Vice-Chancellor's action. "Had University Council merely done this they would have greatly enhanced the Guild's respect for them, the Vice-Chancellor and the University," said Mike Redhouse in Guild Council on Saturday.



No censorship!

"REDBRICK" has been criticised for not taking a stronger line over the temporary censorship of "Wall" and "Redbrick." BUT few people have stopped to consider

the circumstances of last week.

"Redbrick" went on sale only hours before University
Council met. Could we afford to attack, and rile the
Vice-Chancellor; the man who was going to defend the Guild Publications from censorship by the Univer-

Also, the Guild's policy at that time was to settle the Also, the Guild's policy at that time was to settle the matter as quietly as possible so as not to prejudice the passage of the various reports and new regulations which will shortly come before Senate, and the other committees of the University which still have not got student representation.

However, University Gouncil didn't do what they were

supposed to. They endorsed the V.-C.'s actions as was expected, but they then went further. They produced the contradictory letter printed opposite. They held out a carrot in one hand ("opposed to the institution of censorship by the University") and a dagger in the other (the proposals marked (2) and (3) which are so flexible as to rule out all forms of criticisms of University policy, if required). Were they hoping that we would chase the carrot, so that they could stab us in the back?

As the proposals stand, they are completely unacceptable to the editors of all Guild publications, and every member of the Guild. Guild Council saw the danger and passed unopposed the emergency motion, also printed opposite. The University has been forced to

sit up and take notice.

But we must not stop now. Guild Council must stand united and ensure that all the demands we have made are met. The University must be left in no doubt that we do not and will not accept these proposals. They must also be told of the consequences if they choose to stand by them

to stand by them.

The freedom of Birmingham University's student Press is at stake.

Act or shut up

"REDBRICK" is taking a stand over censorship. We did not take a stand over mixed dining because while the Ridge girls are prepared to mean to anyone who will listen, they are not prepared to take any action over this themselves. The only protest was held not in Ridge but High, and mainly organised by the men in High. Only one letter was received from Ridge backing up the Guild publications. The girls have been told that they cannot have mixed dining. They have accepted it and even now have not taken any positive action. But some of them have turned round and condemned "Redbrick," "Wall" and the Guild for not taking a stand over mixed dining.

Stop talking and show us you want mixed dining; then we will support you and take a stand.
